GENERAL MEETING PROGRAM Thursday March 26th, 7:00pm

FISHERIES MANAGEMENT--MANAGING the FISHING LAKES of the FOREST PRESERVES of COOK COUNTY

Ok fishermen and fisherwomen, this one's for you! We are pleased to invite James Phillips, Fisheries Biologist II at the Forest Preserve District of Cook County into our cabin who will present a program on fisheries management. Jim works in the Department of Resource Management's Fisheries Section which manages the Forest Preserves 40 plus fishing lakes throughout the year. Subjects that will be covered include population surveys, fish stocking programs, the Fisheries Section Walleye Propagation Program, the Busse Lake Musky Program and our ongoing work to control the spread of invasive species. This is a wonderful opportunity to learn about lakes management and fishing prospects all over the greater Chicagoland area. Fishing is a core activity in our Preserve so attendees have a great opportunity to broaden their knowledge of this popular sport.

FALL CONTROLLED BURNS

Once again unfavorable weather and scheduling issues limited our controlled burns last Fall. But Steve Wlodarski, our controlled burn chief, was still able on three occasions, Nov 9 and 24 and Dec 7, to conduct successful controlled burns which were concentrated in the western shore areas of the prairie lakes.

We conduct these burns to keep the invasive plant species from taking over and crowding out the native prairie plants. The burning process also puts nutrients back into the soil, especially as we have rain and snow over the winter months. If we did not do these burns periodically, a thick mat of dead vegetation would accumulate preventing much needed precipitation and sunlight from reaching the new growth in the Spring. We typically conduct our Spring burns from early April through mid-May, before the vegetation begins growing again. The surviving native vegetation then fully benefits from the rain and sun of the Spring Season.

NEW ROOF ON THE CABIN

Over the past year or so, you may have noticed some water damage in a few locations inside the cabin. The cause of this damage was the old and deteriorated roof shingles. So we engaged in a competitive bidding process with local roofing companies and the lowest cost bid was submitted by JE Roofing & Construction, a well known company in Homewood. Our mild winter allowed the work to be completed in January. The old shingles were removed and any deteriorated roof boards were replaced. We chose a brown color similar to the prior roof but with a bit more "character." This large expenditure was funded by the proceeds from the sale of 2.6 acres to CN in late 2018 that the Village of Homewood turned over to us for just such needed infrastructure work. We would recommend JE Roofing and Construction to anyone needing roof work.
