<u>SEPTEMBER GENERAL MEETING: Wednesday September 20 7 PM Senior Hall</u> <u>Human and Robotic Exploration of Antarctica – and Planets!</u>

Not all of Antarctica is covered in ice. The ice-free areas are called dry valleys and the largest of these is the McMurdo Dry Valleys where Dr. Peter Doran has been researching hydrology and climatology for the past 30 years. At the Preserve's General Meeting on Wednesday September 20, 2023, Dr. Doran will present a program on his work.

The McMurdo Dry Valleys is considered one of the world's largest and driest deserts, where there are no birds, plants, or mammals. This dry desert biome supports microbes and microscopic soil invertebrates that can live in the harsh environment. The National Science Foundation (NSF) supports a project called the McMurdo Long Term Ecological Research (LTER) site, which is one of 30 sites around the world that monitors the ecological health of different biomes. Dr. Doran's research was part of this larger project.

Dr. Doran also worked with NASA, which funded research using the dry valleys as a reference, or analog, for the environments of other planets like Mars. September's program will cover this work as well as Dr. Doran's role as vice-chair of the international committee that oversees rules for the responsible exploration of the solar system.

Dr. Peter Doran

Dr. Doran is Professor of Geology and Geophysics, and the John Franks Endowed Chair at <u>Louisiana State University</u>. Prior to 2015, he was faculty in Earth and Environmental Sciences at the <u>University</u> of <u>Illinois at Chicago</u>.

Dr. Doran specializes in polar regions, especially Antarctic climate and ecosystems. His broad research interests focus on field techniques in aquatic, climate, ecological and astrobiological sciences. Dr. Doran has conducted more than ten field seasons in the Canadian High Arctic and at last count over twenty-five in the Antarctic.

Dr. Doran also applies his expertise in extreme polar environments to planetary science and has been a member of several NASA-funded projects using polar regions as analogs for Mars and icy/ocean worlds. In 2008, former Apollo astronaut Harrison Schmidt nominated him to the Planetary Protection Subcommittee of the NASA Advisory Council where he served until 2017. In 2018, he was appointed to represent the U.S. as a member of the Committee on Space Research Panel on Planetary Protection and became Vice Chair of the Panel in 2022.

Both an Antarctic stream and glacier were named for Doran by the U.S. Geological Survey to commemorate his many significant research contributions conducted on the continent. Doran was elected as a Fellow of the Geological Society of America in 2018

PURPLE LOOSESTRIFE

This invasive plant (lythrum salicaria) has grown in the Preserve for as long as anyone can remember. Although it displays an attractive purple flower, it is nevertheless non-native and crowds out native plants in wetlands and moist areas of prairies. It's a perennial plant that grows 2'-6' high, can produce in excess of 2 million seeds per plant and has thick woody roots that crowd out native plants. You can find it in many areas of the Preserve, especially in the prairie areas around the prairie lakes. Years ago, long time Board member John Newgard, led volunteer efforts at getting them under control with partial short-term effectiveness. Herbicide was used

but care had to be used to spray only on the loosestrife and not on other nearby native plants. Broadcast spraying with herbicide is not advisable for this plant. Efforts were considerable but results were not long lasting.

But we learned of another solution from board member Dave Zaber about 3 years ago. Certain beetles like to eat this plant's leaves--a natural predator. But it is difficult to obtain the Golden Loosestrife Beetle (Galerucella pusilla) from commercial insect sources. Demand far outstrips supply. Lucky for us, this year this beetle has found its way into the Preserve on its own. So this season we have observed a dramatic decrease in the amount of purple loosestrife growing in the Preserve. Presumably these bugs will stick around for many years helping to keep the purple loosestrife under control!
