1. GLENN KOTCHE FROM THE BAND WILCO----Saturday May 6 7PM

Something new for us—we are teaming up with the Homewood Arts Council (HAC) to present a musical journey with Glenn Kotche, who has been the drummer for over 20 years in the well-known Chicago band **Wilco**. The Grammy award-winning band has logged close to thirty-years since Jeff Tweedy formed the band after the dissolution of Uncle Tupelo. The band's 12th studio album, Cruel Country, was just released last year. Kotche, a native of Roselle, IL, has enjoyed a successful solo career and has worked with artists such as Jim O'Rourke, Ed O'Brien (Radiohead) and Paul K. & The Weathermen. <u>4 NATIVE PLANT SALE----SENIOR HALL</u> SATURDAY MAY 20 9AM—2PM SUNDAY MAY 21 10AM—12PM

Once again this year, the Homewood Izaak Walton Preserve (HIWP) and Thorn Creek Audubon Society (TCAS) are co-sponsoring a native plant sale which is coming up soon. Thirty-seven different plants will be offered, including trees, shrubs, flowers, and ornamental grasses. Plants are chosen to represent different colors, textures, sun exposures and bloom times. All are native to Illinois. Judy Johnson, a member of both organizations and plant sale organizer, stresses that native plants support the environment in several ways. Local wildlife, including pollinators, depend on native plants for food and shelter. Native plants thrive without pesticides or fertilizers and once established do not require watering. The very deep root systems help prevent erosion and flooding.

The deadline for pre-orders was long ago but plenty of plants will be available for sale on the days of sale (with expanded hours) indicated above. Arrive early for the best choices. Check our website for the plant list of what may be available.

5. MAY GENERAL MEETING—THURSDAY MAY 25 7PM—SENIOR HALL SHIFTING CHICAGO; A TALE OF ICE AND WATER

We enjoy walking around the Preserve and enjoying the various aspects of the topography that it offers. But a rich past preceded what we see today. Chicago's geological history includes coral reefs and tropical forests, but the land surface of the region is the product of the glaciers of the last ice age and their aftermath. While the settlement and development of the Chicago area is the direct result of what the glaciers left behind, human activities have greatly modified the natural environment. The interactions between people and the natural landscapes, such as the reversal of the Chicago River, create ongoing environmental concerns.

Roy E. Plotnick is Professor Emeritus in the Department of Earth and Environmental Sciences at the University of Illinois at Chicago. He is a fellow of the Geological Society of America and the Paleontological Society and the author of *Explorers of Deep Time*, published by Columbia University Press. So come out and be amazed by what you will learn about our rich geological past!

MILKWEED SEEDS AVAILABLE - SAVE THE MONARCH BUTTERFLIES!

Once again this year we will have milkweed seed packets available in the cabin during regular office hours (Saturdays from 9-noon) **for no charge.** Kay MacNeil who is very passionate about the amazing Monarchs, distributes these packets in our area every Spring. Kay has been working to save the Monarch Butterfly for many years. Key to these efforts is the propagation of milkweed, as Monarchs lay their eggs exclusively on milkweed which, subsequently provide food for the caterpillars. Consequently milkweed populations have dropped and along with them, the Monarch Butterfly population. Aside from the Monarch's natural beauty, they are truly remarkable in that they (a) turn from caterpillars to butterflies right here in the Midwest, (b) migrate to Central Mexico for the winter, (c) and then return north to lay more eggs before they die. So spread the word and plant Milkweed seeds: you can also order your own seeds: just send Kay \$3 cash and a self addressed business size envelope The price simply covers cost; no profit is earned.
